General Rules

1. This show will meet the requirements and objectives of a Standard Flower Show as stated in *Handbook for Flower Shows* (2007 Revised Edition). The *Handbook for Flower Shows* will be used as the authority in all points not covered by this schedule.
2. This flower show will be staged in three divisions: Design, Horticulture, and Special Exhibits. Each division is divided into sections and classes.
3. Entries should be taken to Gilmer Arts and Heritage at the following times:

4. Judging will begin at noon, Friday June 6. During judging, the following chairmen are allowed on the floor: General Show Chairman, Clerks Chair., Horticulture Placement Chair., Design Classification Chair., Hospitality Chair., and Clerks.
5. Judging will be according to the National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC) Standard System of Awarding. In each class only one first place ribbon (blue) scoring 90 or above, one second place ribbon (red) scoring 85 or above, one third place ribbon (yellow) scoring 80 or above, and one or more honorable mention ribbons (white) scoring 75 or above, may be awarded at the discretion of the judges whose decision shall be final. Ribbons may be withheld if not merited. Judges are requested to sign and date all blue ribbons. Judges are requested to review the red, yellow and white winning exhibits in design and horticulture to determine if any scored 90 or above. On any exhibit scoring in the 90's, an accredited judge is to write 90+ on the entry card, date and sign. Signature labels will be provided for judges convenience.
6. Exhibits must be removed between 3:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m., Saturday, June 7.
7. Exhibitors will not be allowed to serve as clerks in sections or classes in which they are exhibiting.
8. The Garden Club of Ellijay will execute the utmost care in handling properties, but cannot be responsible for loss or damage.
9. All entries are to be the work of one designer.
10. The use of plants on the State Conservation List are prohibited, unless grown by exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner and so marked. Other native plants may be exhibited provided they are grown by the exhibitor. The State Conservation list is located in the back of this schedule.
11. There must be an emphasis on **fresh** plant material. No artificial plant material in any division.
12. The show will be open to the public from 3:00 to 5:30 p.m. on June 6 and from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. on Saturday, June 7.

Awards & Ribbons

The following NGC Top Awards may be awarded to the blue ribbon winners scoring 95 or above provided all requirements for top awards as specified in the *Handbook* have been met, pages 41-52. **The correct botanical names are required for Top Award winners in the Horticulture Division.**

Division I – Design

NGC Designer’s Choice Award - A rosette of purple ribbons: One may be awarded to the highest scoring design in Section A, Classes 1, 2, or 3.

NGC Designer’s Choice Award - A rosette of purple ribbons: One may be awarded to the highest scoring design in Section B, Classes 4, 5, or 6.

NGC Award of Design Excellence - A rosette of gold ribbons: One may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibit in the entire Design Division.

Division II – Horticulture

NGC Award of Merit - A rosette of orange ribbons: Five may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibits in Sections A, B, C, D, and E.

NGC Arboreal Award Ribbon - A rosette of green ribbons in two shades: Two may be awarded, one for the highest scoring shrub specimen in Section F and one for the highest scoring tree specimen in Section G.

NGC Award of Horticultural Excellence - A rosette of green, orange & blue ribbons: One may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibit in the entire Horticultural Division.

Division III- Special Exhibits

NGC Educational Top Exhibitor Award - A rosette of brown & white ribbons: One may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibit in Division III, Section A.

NGC Youth Top Exhibitor Award - A rosette of red, white & blue ribbons: Three may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibits (one in each age group) in Division III, Section B.

NGC Sweepstakes Award Ribbon: Two may be awarded per show (one in Design Division and one in Horticulture Division) to members of The Garden Club of Ellijay, one for the most points in Horticulture and one for the most points in Design, based on the following system:

First Place (blue) 3 points
Second Place (red) . . . 2 points
Third Place (yellow) . . . 1 point

Design Rules

1. The Design Division is open to members of The Garden Club of Ellijay and members of The Garden Club of Georgia, Inc.
2. All entries must be pre-registered with the Design Entries Chairman by May 7, 2008.
3. Each design entered in competition must be the work of only one exhibitor, and must not have been exhibited in a previous show. That exhibitor's name must appear on the entry card.
4. If the designer is unable to fulfill the assignment, it is the responsibility of the designer to provide a substitute and notify the Design Entries Chairman prior to the show.
5. There will be six classes with four exhibits in each class. Exhibitors may only enter one design in each class, but may enter more than one class.
6. Some plant material must be used in every exhibit. No artificial flowers, fruit, foliage, or vegetables may be used. Fresh fruits, vegetables or berries may be incorporated into a design but may not be cut. Plant material used in a design need not be grown by the exhibitor.
7. Plant material that has been treated to alter its exterior appearance may be used in its dried state in the Design Division. Fresh plant material may never be treated. Contrived flowers or other forms made from real plant materials, fresh or dried, are allowed.
8. Accessory objects, panels, frames, boxes, cubes, bases and underlays may all be incorporated into designs. Landscapes or scenes are not permitted in the Design Division.
9. The use of plants on the State Conservation List are prohibited, unless grown by exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner and so marked. Other native plants may be exhibited provided they are grown by the exhibitor. The State Conservation list is located in the back of this schedule.
10. Living members of the animal kingdom are not permitted in the Design Division. Taxidermy e.g. mammals, birds, fish, etc. are not permitted in competitive designs.
11. Religious symbols must be displayed in a respectful manner and in accordance with local policies of religious organizations.
12. The official American flag and other nations' flags are not permitted to be used in designs. Flags as underlays, backgrounds, skirting, draping, etc. are all prohibited throughout all divisions of the flower show.
13. A 3x5 card listing the plant material used must accompany the design. Plant material must be listed by botanical and common name. Card will be provided by the show committee.
14. A brief interpretation on a 3x5 card may accompany exhibit.
15. The show committee will furnish all staging, except when otherwise stated.

Division I – Design

Vibrant Festivals East & West

Entries in this division are eligible for the NGC Award of Design Excellence (HB p. 45-46)

Section A - The Americas Put On A Show

Entries in this section are eligible for the NGC Designer's Choice Award (HB p. 47-48)

This Section is a novice section which applies to anyone who has not previously won a blue ribbon in a NGC flower show.

Class 1. Canada - Calgary Stampede *The Greatest Outdoor Show on Earth*

Four designs, designer's choice of style, each staged on a 42" tall black pedestal with 16" round top. Pedestals will be supplied by the show committee. Drape or underlay may be used and may extend down from the edge of the pedestal. Background is off-white wall.

Class 2. Brazil - Carnival *Rio de Janeiro is home to the most famous carnival in the world*

Four designs, designer's choice of style, each staged on a 42" tall black pedestal with 16" round top. Pedestals will be supplied by the show committee. Drape or underlay may be used and may extend down from the edge of the pedestal. Background is off-white wall.

Class 3. Peru - Festival of the Sun (Inti Raymi) *An ancient Inca festival celebrating the beginning of the Sun's New Year*

Four designs, designer's choice of style, each staged on a black, 12" cube supplied by the show committee. Cubes will sit on a 30" tall banquet table covered with a green cloth. Underlays may be used but may NOT extend over the edge of the cube. Background is off-white wall.

Section B - Asia's Dazzling Celebrations

Entries in this section are eligible for the NGC Designer's Choice Award (HB p. 47-48)

Class 4. China - Chinese New Year *The most important of the traditional Chinese holidays*

Four designs, designer's choice of style, each staged on a black, 10" cube supplied by the show committee. Cubes will sit on a 30" tall banquet table covered with a green cloth. Underlays may be used but may NOT extend over the edge of the cube. Background is off-white wall.

Class 5. Thailand - Water Festival (Loy Krathong) *Small handmade rafts decorated with banana leaves, flowers, incense and candles are set afloat on rivers during the full moon*

Four designs, designer's choice of style, each staged on a black square pedestal 40" tall and 18" square top. Pedestal is provided by the show committee. Drape or underlay may be used and may extend down from the edge of the pedestal. Background is off-white wall.

Class 6. India - Festival of Lights (Diwali) *Homes and gardens are illuminated during this festival which signifies the victory of good over evil*

Four designs, designer's choice of style, each staged on a black 36" tall box pedestal with 24" square top provided by the show committee. Drape or underlay may be used and may extend down from the edge of the pedestal. Background is off-white wall.

Horticulture Rules

1. The Horticulture Division is open to any amateur gardener.
2. All horticulture specimens must be fresh plant material grown by the exhibitor. They must be well groomed, clean, and of show quality. A plant that is grown for its bloom must be in bloom at the time of judging. All entries must have been in the exhibitor's possession for 90 days. Exception: Combination plantings must have been grown together and in exhibitor's possession for at least six weeks prior to exhibiting.
3. All specimens should be correctly labeled with botanical names, giving genus and species and/or variety/cultivar where available. Common names may be given in addition. Specimens must be botanically named to be eligible for any NGC Top Exhibitor Award.
4. An exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in any one class or sub-class provided each exhibit is of a different genus, species, variety, cultivar, type, form, size, or color.
5. Plant material may NOT be altered by the application of oil, commercial shine products, etc. that may artificially change the natural color and texture.
6. All entries must be approved by the Horticulture Classification Chairman who shall have the authority to disqualify any entry not conforming to the schedule and/or not of show quality. The Horticulture Classification Chairman may sub-divide according to variety, cultivar, type, size, color as necessary.
7. Container entries must have been in exhibitor's possession at least 90 days. Containers must not exceed 10" in diameter and should be in proportion to the plant. If the plant extends below the container, exhibitor must furnish an inverted container so that the extended plant does not cascade on to the tabletop. No hanging plants. Double potting is permitted.
8. Only members of the Horticulture Placement Committee will place exhibits.
9. Cut specimens will be staged in a clear glass bottle furnished by the show committee. Cut specimens should not have foliage below the water line: exception - gladiolus.
10. Exhibitors may wedge cut specimens with small inconspicuous piece of clear plastic wrap provided by the Show Committee.
11. Arboreal specimens must have several nodes and be at least 8" long and may not be more than 30" in length from tip to cut end.
12. The use of plants on the State Conservation List are prohibited. Other native plants may be exhibited provided they are grown by the exhibitor. The State Conservation List is located in the back of this schedule.
13. All entry cards and entry sheets should be filled out in advance and may be obtained from the Horticulture Entries Chairman.

Section A - Educational Exhibit Rules:

1. Educational exhibits must clearly convey to the public the goals and objectives of the National Garden Club, Inc.
2. Information should be presented in a quick, forceful and interesting manner.
3. Fresh plant material is encouraged, but not required.
4. Each exhibit must be the work of an individual exhibitor.
5. Total space used must be at least 18 square feet.
6. Exhibitors must be members of The National Garden Club, Inc.
7. In order to qualify for the NGC Educational Award the exhibit must score 95 or above.
8. Educational Exhibits must be reserved with the Special Exhibits Chairman.
9. The exhibits will be staged on banquet tables 6' long, and 30" deep. The tables will be covered in a green cloth but may be additionally covered by the exhibitor.
